## Liendo Immersion/Reenactment

All immersionites who wish to go in Friday night must be at the immersion staging area by 11:00 pm that evening. Otherwise, entry to the immersion area will commence at 8:30 Saturday morning. BRING AXES, BOW SAW and SHOVELS. An Officers/NCO call will be held at 10:00 pm at the immersionite staging area. An arms and accoutrements inspection immediately follows the Officer/NCO call. If you cannot be there on Friday, then there will be a general cease-fire in the immersion area starting around 8:30 am on Saturday. At that time, a second round of immersionites will be allowed to enter the area.

All others taking part in the "regular reenactment" may stay in the static camp with the 13<sup>th</sup> US Infantry. Just ask for Capt. Rick Beatty or 1<sup>st</sup> Sgt. Tim Schneider. Rules of the Event state that anyone camping in the static camp is **not** permitted to partake in the Immersion event.

## **Packing for Campaign *or* What I'm Taking to Liendo**

I know there has been some discussion and concern about uniform and equipment requirements for Liendo. Some of the posted information on the net can seem pretty outlandish but in reality I'm not doing anything special for this event that I wouldn't do for any other campaign type event. Finding out what is "right" is a never-ending journey in reenacting. I bought stuff way back that I don't even use any more. Every time I go into the field I reevaluate what I need to bring and what I can leave behind. Going on a campaign is easy because you don't have to pack a bunch of stuff. I like my creature comforts as much as the next guy but there is something to be said for grabbing your knapsack and walking into camp, not to mention grabbing the same knapsack and walking to the car come Sunday afternoon. Enough philosophy, here is what I am bringing.

To sleep in: rubber blanket, poncho, blanket, one shelter half, and my self-inflating mattress. I choose to take this last item even though the stitch nazis would have a fit if they saw it. If I was ten years younger or didn't have a bad hip I would leave this behind. The mattress is inside pillow ticking and gets rolled up in the rubber blanket and strapped to the top of my knapsack. Not exactly regulation since the straps are actually to hold the overcoat, which I don't have. The blanket and shelter half go in the knapsack. If it looks like it will be really cold that weekend I might take a second blanket. Setting up to sleep is easy. Put down the rubber blanket, roll out my mattress (when nobody is looking) and spread out my blanket folded in half lengthwise. The shelter half goes on top. I'm taller than the shelter half so I use my poncho to cover my legs and feet. This will keep you warm and dry in most situations.

In my knapsack I'll pack an extra shirt, underwear, 2 pair socks, housewife, candle,

washrag, some rope, gun cleaning supplies, and a poke bag with my pain medicine, toothbrush, first aid, matches, and car keys. I'll probably also pack an extra cup (or plate) as I can't stand mixing my coffee with my beans.

In my haversack I'll have a spoon, pocketknife, and cup. That's it. The rest of the space is for rations that will be issued when I get there. Oh yea, I also keep my reading glasses in here (not period but sometimes you gotta be able to see).

My accoutrements are all up to speed. I've already shortened up the strap on my canteen and haversack (sewn not knotted) so this stuff rides on my hip. Same for cartridge box. I'm wearing the same uniform I've always worn. If someone complains about my not having hand sewn buttonholes they're invading my personal space. I'll forgo polishing my brass but my leathers will be oiled and blackened.

What do I need to do to improve my impression? For the past two years I've been meaning to cut out the brass grommets in my shelter half and re stitch the holes. This is a good time to finally get that done but if I don't I'm not going to worry about it. I'd like to have a hand sewn issue shirt but that's something that will have to wait for next February. First person? Not to worry. Real firpir is almost a full time job. Just leave home the modern talk and confine conversation to what is going on in the scenario. This should be easy since most of the casual modern conversation occurs while we're waiting for the action to begin - the "action" will be full time here.

The 1st is a progressive unit with a good overall impression. We've proven in the past we can fight and campaign with the best of 'em. Make some poke bags, leave the plastic at home, and come out for an outstanding time. At least this time we won't have to worry about the opposing artillery guys walking through our camp to get to their starting places before the battle.

## “Here's what I'll be packing”

(Liendo Immersion)

In the knapsack:

Greatcoat (you better believe it...)  
blanket  
poncho (to sleep on)  
rubber blanket (helps keep dew off your blanket)  
extra shirt & socks  
2 candles  
matches  
gun cleaning items  
handkerchief  
mucket

In the haversack:

wooden spoon  
canteen half  
tin cup  
coffee beans & sugar  
salt cured bacon or salt cured ham (wrapped in parchment paper)

split peas  
parched corn  
sweet potato  
hard bread  
dried peaches  
cooking rags (helps with cleanup and straining coffee grounds)

Sounds like a lot, but it fits if you pack it right. Besides, a nice hot stew for dinner on a cold Saturday night tastes real good. I'll probably bring about 60-70 rounds. I encourage all members to attempt this event, as it should be a blast. If there's anything I can do to help someone make this event, please don't hesitate to contact me.

We had a kettle of baked beans recently. The way we bake them is this: we dig a round hole in the ground about two and a half feet in depth by two in diameter, then make a fire of hard wood in the hole and keep it up till the hole is nearly of coals and very hot. In the mean time we parboil the beans in a large iron camp kettle, put in the pork, and get them all ready; then shovel the coals out of the hole and put the kettle in; put a piece of paper and a board over the top of the kettle and then fill in with the coals all around the pot; next, cover the whole with earth. In about ten hours they will be about equal to those we could get at home.
